

1. FINISH THE SENTENCE WITH THE LONG FORM OF PERSONAL PRONOUN

It's my bag. It's mine It's our car. The car is ours
They're her shoes. The shoes are hers It's her house. The house is hers
They're your books. The books are yours It's his coat. The coat is his

2. COMPLETE WITH THE RIGHT FORM OF THE POSSESSIVE PRONOUN (short or long form).

1. Is this your (you) book? No, it's his (he).
2. It's their (they) problem, not ours (we).
3. Are these our (we) shoes? No, they're theirs (they).
4. That's not my (I) umbrella. mine (I) is yellow.
5. They know our (we) address, but we don't know theirs (they).
6. They've got two children, but I don't know their (they) names.
7. My (I) room is smaller than hers (she), but mine (I) is nicer.

3. FINISH THE SENTENCES WITH 'friends of mine/yours/his...'

Eg.: I went to the cinema with a friend of mine.

1. She's going out with a friend of hers 4. They went on holidays with some friends of theirs
2. He played tennis with a friend of his 5. We had dinner with some friends of ours
3. Do you know that man? Is he a friend of yours 6. You will meet a friend of yours

4. FINISH THE SENTENCES WITH REFLEXIVE PRONOUNS (myself/ himself/... Yourselves).

1. He enjoyed himself 5. I enjoyed myself
2. She enjoyed herself 6. Bob and I enjoyed ourselves
3. Did you enjoy yourself (one person)? 7. Jack didn't enjoy himself
4. Did you enjoy yourselves (several people)? 8. The children enjoyed themselves

5. FINISH THE SENTENCES WITH REFLEXIVE PRONOUNS.

Eg.: I cut myself with a knife.

- Be careful! The plate is very hot. You can burn yourself
- I'm not angry with you. I'm angry with myself
- They never think about other people. They only think about themselves
- I got out of the bath and dried myself with a towel.
- When people are alone, they often talk to themselves
- The police say that the man shot himself with a gun.
- Don't pay for me. I want to pay for myself
- He fell off the ladder but he didn't hurt himself
- I'd like to know more about you. Tell me about yourself (one person)
- Good-bye! Have a good holiday and look after yourselves (two people).

6. MAKE SENTENCES WITH REFLEXIVE PRONOUNS (by myself/ by himself/... by ourselves).

Eg.: I went on holiday alone. = I went by myself.

- Do you live alone? = Do you live by yourself John lives alone. John lives by himself
- I had dinner alone. = I ate by myself She went to the cinema alone.
- When I saw him, he was alone. = When I saw him, he was by himself She went to the cinema by herself

7. FINISH THE SENTENCES, USE 'EACH OTHER'

- I looked at Bill and Bill looked at me. Bill and I looked at one another / each other
- I know him and he knows me. We know each other
- She likes him and he likes her. They like each other
- You can help me and I can help you. We can help each other
- Tom didn't see Jill and Jill didn't see Tom. Tom and Jill didn't see each other
- I didn't speak to her and she didn't speak to me. We didn't speak to each other
- He understands her and she understands him. They understand each other
